

Why do we use Future Simple (will)?

Future Simple (*will*) expresses spontaneity. We use it to talk about decisions made at the moment of speaking. They are usually spontaneous decisions, such as offers, promises or threats. We also use it to talk about predictions without any evidence, such as hopes or assumptions. It is very common to make up sentences with 'I think...' or 'I don't think...', 'I'm sure...', 'I expect...' 'I bet...'.



Spontaneous decision examples...


This blue t-shirt looks good on me. I think I'll buy it. (A decision made at the moment of speaking.)


I'll help the old lady cross the street. (A decision made at the moment of speaking.)


Hey, It's really cold inside. I'll turn on the heating. (An offer)

I'll kill you! (A threat)

I'll always love you. (A promise)







Why do we use 'be going to' future?


We use 'going to' future to talk about predictions based on what we can see. Also, we use it to talk about plans and intentions. They are premeditated thoughts.


Prediction with an evidence examples...

There is a banana skin on the floor. Someone is going to fall.


There are black clouds. It's going to rain.

Maggie and Tom **aren't going to finish** the test on time. There are only two minutes left.











We use **will** and **the base form verb** for all personal pronouns. The short form is '**//**. In negatives we use "**won't**" and **the base form verb** again for all personal pronouns.

For example...

I'll make some sandwiches.

 He won't make some sandwiches.







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
